When the parade concludes at the Chapel, there will be games and prizes for the kids, food for purchase, and plenty of patriotism as we honor Independence Day. I have some volunteers who have agreed to help in all this, but if you would like to help also with



kids' games or whatever, please let me know. I do hope it won't be rained out like last year, because I'm looking forward to food, fun, and friends on that day. See you there!

I have noticed and picked up more **trash on our roadsides** lately and heard complaints from some of you as well. If you see someone break our city's litter ordinance, please get a tag number and report it to our Ordinance Enforcement Officer. You can also contact Gwinnett Clean & Beautiful at gwinnettcb.org and they will make a report to law enforcement officers. They ask that you record the date, time, make and model of the car, license # and what type of litter to help them in their report. I may be naive, but I have a hard time thinking our Berkeley Lake neighbors are throwing all this out. Since the economy has improved there's a lot of construction going on, and some of those workers may be throwing

out trash or having it blow off the back of trucks. If you have a project going on, please talk to your contractor and/or workers about the importance of keeping our community clean.

Congratulations to Bryan Stuart (at left) who has recently been asked to serve on the Board of Directors for the Southwest Gwinnett Chamber of Commerce. He replaces **Don Allen** of River District who is retiring. Both men are a credit to our city and an asset to the larger community that the Chamber serves.

Congratulations also to **Tom Merkel** of Miramont who has been chosen as one of 40 outstanding leaders countywide to participate in Leadership Gwinnett's Class of 2015. This is a very high honor and will require a significant commitment of time on his part throughout the coming year. Tom is President and CEO of The IMPACT! Group.

Again this year we are having a **School Supply Drive** for needy kids in our area who won't have crayons, pencils, or much of anything to take to school in August. If you can help, please bring some to City Hall and we'll get them to the right place. This drive is being coordinated by the Southwest Gwinnett Chamber of Commerce.

You may want to know about **Operation Second Chance**, or **Jail Dogs**, which began as a partnership between Sheriff Butch Conway and the Gwinnett County Sheriff's Department and Society of Humane Friends of Georgia. The program saves dogs from Gwinnett County Animal Control, vets and trains them, and offers them for adoption. It's a great way to get an already well trained pet, and to save a life.

Please remember that school is out and **kids are playing** throughout our community. We need to be especially alert for all the little ones on their bikes and skate boards as we drive through and around the city.

Hollywood comes to Gwinnett! Recently Council members Rodney Hammond, Bob Smith, Rebecca Spitler and I were able to tour Atlanta Media Campus Studios where they have already filmed "Hunger Games", "Fast and Furious", and "Walk in the Woods" (with Robert Redford and Nick Nolte).

In closing, I wish you a very happy Fourth, and I want to share the following with you. I can't find an attribution, but these are not my words. I just think they're worth your consideration:

Have you ever wondered what happened to the 56 men who signed the Declaration of Independence? Five signers were captured by the British as traitors, and tortured before they died. Twelve had their homes ransacked and burned. Two lost their sons serving in the Revolutionary Army; another had two sons captured. Nine of the 56 fought and died from wounds or hardships of the Revolutionary War. They signed and they pledged their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honor. What kind of men were they?

Twenty-four were lawyers and jurists. Eleven were merchants, nine were farmers and large plantation owners; men of means, well educated, but they signed the Declaration of Independence knowing full well that the penalty would be death if they were captured. Carter Braxton of Virginia, a wealthy planter and trader, saw his ships swept from the seas by the British Navy. He sold his home and properties to pay his debts, and died in rags. Thomas McKeam was so hounded by the British that he was forced to move his family almost constantly. He served in the Congress without pay, and his family was kept in hiding. His possessions were taken from him, and poverty was his reward. Vandals or soldiers looted the properties of Dillery, Hall, Clymer, Walton, Gwinnett, Heyward, Ruttledge, and Middleton. At the battle of Yorktown, Thomas Nelson, Jr., noted that the British General Cornwallis had taken over the Nelson home for his headquarters. He quietly urged General George Washington to open fire. The home was destroyed, and Nelson died bankrupt. Francis Lewis had his home and properties destroyed. The enemy jailed his wife, and she died within a few months. John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside as she was dying. Their 13 children fled for their lives. His fields and his gristmill were laid to waste. For more than a year he lived in forests and caves, returning home to find his wife dead and his children vanished.
