Perhaps because the Fourth is coming up, I've had quite a few questions about **fireworks** and have asked your city council to consider some divergent citizen opinions. Some of you love fireworks and some of you hate the noise and risk to yourselves and your property. Your council is working to meet concerns as best they can and finding that we're very restricted by your state legislature. That body has disallowed municipalities from limiting fireworks hours beyond the following: any day from 10:00 AM until 9:00 PM except on July 3-4 and December 31 when the hours are extended until 11:59 PM and on January 1 until 1:00 AM. They do specify that no fireworks can be ignited on public property without a special use permit. That means nobody can shoot fireworks in streets or right-of-ways or on the dam or city hall and park property. While people have occasionally tried to do this in streets, reasoning that it's the farthest they can get in their neighborhood from people's homes, we have already had an instance of someone igniting fireworks in the street which landed on and set fire to someone's yard. It could easily have landed on someone's house and we're all grateful that hasn't happened - so far! Few of us are able to control exactly where fireworks go and I very strongly urge you to be extremely cautious if you choose to use them.

I also urge you to be considerate of your neighbors who will probably not appreciate being awakened by them very late at night or in the wee hours of the morning, regardless of what the

legislature allows. Although they have limited municipal restrictions, there are no such restrictions on homeowners associations; and I know that some of those leaders in our city are already discussing new restrictions in their neighborhoods. Meanwhile, I hope you will all enjoy this holiday safely and with consideration to others. Also, please protect your pets by keeping them inside, perhaps with music to mask the sound of explosions outside. July 5 is routinely the highest day of the year for reported lost animals because many of them panic and run away. Remember to take care of your furry family members.



I have very good news to report about a **safety grant that City Administrator Tom Rozier won for our city**. It is getting harder and harder to win grants and Tom's efforts saved our taxpayers \$10,000. The money has already been spent on the safety installation at a curve on Lakeshore Drive which had been the site of several accidents and on the stop-bars at the intersections in Berkeley Walk, Berkeley Field and Miramont. When you see Tom, thank him for his efforts in holding your taxes down. He does that diligently and often in many ways that go unreported.

Here's another reminder to "Tip and Toss" anything in your yard that collects water and breeds mosquitoes. I'm also including some ideas here about plants that **repel mosquitoes** and other pests from your yard:

Marigolds contain a natural compound used in many insect repellents. Plant some near windows and doorways where mosquitoes might enter. About the only insects you see around **lavender** are bees. They love the flowers, but other bugs stay away. Hang some dried lavender in your closet and you won't have to worry about moths eating your clothes. It's a drought resistant perennial. **Lemon grass** contains citronella, a common natural ingredient in many mosquito repellents. The plant itself does even better at deterring mosquitoes than citronella candles and torches because it has a stronger smell. Lemon grass tolerates heat and drought but not frost. **Garlic** and **mint** repel bugs, and **catnip** is 10 times more effective than DEET, the chemical found in most commercial insect repellents. **Rosemary** and **basil** are used for cooking but double as bug repellent. **Petunias** have pretty flowers and also a licorice-like scent that most bugs don't like. Get rid of your English ivy and plant some of these in its place. I got this information for you from 11 Alive News.
