


October 20, 2017

Although we won't need to vote for council members, a special referendum will be held on Tuesday, November 7, 2017 at City Hall



between the hours of 7:00 AM and 7:00 PM to decide the following simple ballot question: "Shall the issuance of licenses for the package sale of distilled spirits be approved?" Early voting is available at City Hall Monday - Thursday, from now through November 2 during regular business hours, 11:00 AM - 4:00 PM. I am happy to share with you that the **millage rate will be dropping again this year** to 1.69% below the rollback rate. 

The Gwinnett County Office of Emergency Management has tapped into an existing feature on cellular telephones that alerts users when an



imminent threat to safety occurs in their area. The new wireless emergency alerts will be sent by the County to all wireless phones that are located in close proximity to an emergency in Gwinnett. Alerts will include the time and type of alert and any action residents and visitors in the affected area should take. I believe that Gwinnett's Emergency Management organization does an excellent job for us, and according to its Director Greg Swanson: "These alerts will be sent to any enabled mobile device in range of the broadcasting cell tower, so it helps us reach those who need to avoid or evacuate a specific area in the county or to shelter-in-place to maintain their safety." The alerts will be sent when emergency events—such as an earthquake, immediate evacuation, fire, or hazardous materials leak or spill—pose a threat to life. To ensure that you receive these lifesaving alerts, make sure the emergency alerts feature is enabled and activated on your mobile device. Some of you have been concerned about the difficulty of finding a **glass recycling** location. The nearby City of Norcross is now offering this at 345 Lively Avenue Public Works, Utilities & Parks facility. This is for glass only – glass bottles (soft drinks, wine bottles, beer bottles, and other glass bottles). No other types of glass will be accepted. No mirrors, window panes or drinking glasses. This service will be available Monday through Friday, 8:00 AM– 5:00 PM. Please ring bell at front door for assistance.

I recently received some information from Theresa Sipe about coyotes. You may find this research reported in *Emory Magazine* helpful. Here's a quote from scientist Larry Wilson in the magazine article: "People think coyotes live and hunt in packs, but that's actually a myth. In most of the areas around here, it's typically a breeding pair and their offspring. When you get rid of an adult, you're probably going to have young males that don't know how to hunt, and they're more likely



to go after easy targets. They are amazingly adaptable, so as long as there is habitat and food supply, there will be coyotes. That's why it's really better to learn to coexist. As predators go, coyotes are on the small side, so they rarely go after large pets. The mainstays of their diet are vegetation and berries, rodents, and the occasional tasty bit of road kill—call it fast food. Coyotes are furtive, stealthy, and smart, and usually they can live alongside humans undetected." Thanks to Theresa for sharing this.
