There's been some interest already in our yearly **Earth Day** celebration. We're having it this year on Saturday, April 21 from 9:00 AM until 2:00 PM. Our staff will be on hand at City Hall, along with vendors and volunteers to assist you with shredding documents, disposal of unwanted items and recycling of others.

• Advanced Disposal will be accepting yard waste and large household items such as desks, mattresses, box springs, etc.

• Crawford Metal Recycling will be accepting scrap metal, appliances, lawn mowers, grills, car and truck batteries, and other metal items.

• Iron Mountain will be providing onsite shredding. **Thanks to the Rice Settlage Team** for sponsoring part of the shredding cost.

Please remember that this service is provided by the City of Berkeley Lake at no cost only to citizens, so bring your identification showing a Berkeley Lake address in order to dispose of or recycle items. The following items will not be accepted: construction debris, wet paints, entire trees, televisions, microwave ovens, tires. If you need to dispose of a television, please call Advanced Disposal at (678) 495-0058 to make arrangements with them to pick the television up at your home.

I recently met with some of the local leadership for **Georgia Power** for a review of their response to Hurricane Irma, the most recent big storm that hit us so hard. Irma's damage was a real challenge for Georgia Power because so many personnel and resources had been sent to Texas for Hurricane Harvey, and then sent to Florida where Irma was expected to be the worst. When Irma veered, the damage was unexpectedly severe in our state and Georgia Power pulled repair crews from as far away as Canada to help us. Hurricanes are certainly unpredictable, but I believe every effort was made to help us get back to normal as quickly as possible. They also wanted us to know that they are upgrading their communication to customers' cell phones. In a storm damage situation, you can now use your cell to access outage maps and information, get text updates for your specific location, etc. which should be helpful. Let's hope we don't need help anytime soon!

As most of you know, our city has been awarded the **Tree City recognition** every year since 2000. One of the requirements which must be met yearly is community planting of trees to celebrate Arbor Day. Thanks go to our Berkeley Lake Conservancy chair Susan Hanson and member Chris Kimberley who are seen here planting for us all.

My neighboring mayor of Duluth, Nancy Harris, serves on the Board of Directors for the Atlanta Regional Commission. The ARC studies and



attempts to provide guidance for municipal and county governments throughout the metro area, so talking with Nancy is quite educational. I learned from her that **Gwinnett will soon overtake Fulton as the most populous county** in the state and that the **aging** of our population and **transportation** difficulties for us all are major concerns. By 2030, 1 in 4 people in metro Atlanta will be over 60, affecting plans for housing, healthcare, and mobility, among other things. Nobody needs to tell you that transportation is a huge problem here because we all struggle with traffic, affecting businesses' desire to locate here (bringing jobs), and our quality of life in general. Nancy says that 70% of commuters in the metro area cross two or more county lines to get to work, so transportation is not just a local county problem but a regional issue that will require regional solutions.

I learned at another meeting that traffic is expected to get exponentially worse as more shipping comes into the deepened port at Savannah. That is a very good thing for our state's economy and they're adding these huge cranes to unload containers from the ships which will then be transferred by trucks up through Georgia to the whole Eastern seaboard. However, the increasing truck traffic through Atlanta will have significant impact on our already overcrowded roads. Ugh!



Welcome to Todd Wilhite who has recently been hired as another City Marshal. Gene is introducing him around, so some of you may have met him already. Todd spent 20 years as a police officer, retiring as a Sergeant, in a city where he supervised the Community Policing Unit for 6 of those years. He also supervised other units, winning two Medals of Honor, and the Chief's Special Recognition Award twice. He and his wife have two children. Todd told me that, although he met some very interesting people in the back of his police car, he never felt he had to berate them. He tried to treat them all "as if they were my grandmother."
