I recently attended a meeting in Lawrenceville about **emergency services**, and learned a lot that made me feel good about living here. Our Gwinnett County fire fighters are trained for 16 months as EMTs and paramedics. They receive 80,000 emergency calls a year of which 75% are not fire but medical. There are trained "Haz Mat" and Swift Water Rescue personnel as well, and their overall departmental goal is to be no more than 6.5 minutes from dispatch to arriving on any emergency scene. Because with heart attacks "time is muscle," our first responders are in direct communication on scene with cardiologists in the hospital, not just verbally, but with various high-tech instrumentation. They are particularly concerned that Gwinnett's senior population will double in the next two decades, and they want to help us stay safely in our homes for as long as we can. To that end, they will make free home safety visits if requested to advise on potential hazards. There was a lot more information than I can put here, but if you're interested in learning more or want to arrange a home visit, let me know and I'll help. You can also join the Citizen Fire Academy if you want to ride the trucks, wear the gear, etc. Our county citizens rated the Gwinnett Fire and Emergency Services a 4.8 out of 5, which is very high relative to other areas. Glad to be in Gwinnett!
