A **black bear** has been spotted by three of our neighbors in Miramont, South Berkeley Lake Road and Paradise Cove (Lakeshore Drive.) Kaye Berg, Miramont HOA President, contacted the

Department of Natural Resources who said that they are aware of a group of young bears that are traveling through this area. Obviously, we shouldn't approach bears (tell your kids this), but they're unlikely to attack people. They can be skittish if they are eating and may take an upright stance which doesn't necessarily mean they are going to attack. Don't leave any trash outside unsecured, or pet food or bird feeders. Thanks to Kaye for sharing this advice.



I have also consulted the Chattahoochee Nature Center's Wildlife Director who spoke recently at our Wildlife Seminar. She shared this article and said there was a bear peeking into the LA Fitness at Johnson Ferry and Roswell Road a while back. That's certainly a crowded urban area. River and water corridors are like highways for wild animals because they can go under roads and largely avoid humans. That, of course, makes Berkeley Lake a prime thoroughfare since we are right on the Chattahoochee River and have worked hard to keep our greenspaces. All kinds of animals are being run out of what used to be forests in north Georgia but are now becoming subdivisions. I expect we will see more of them searching for any space they can find.

All this makes the **Wildlife Seminar** that we had recently in City Hall all the more timely, and it was certainly well attended. Every seat was filled and the comments were all very appreciative of our expert speaker Kathryn Dudeck. She surely knew a lot and fielded our many questions well.

The city will soon begin trimming back low-hanging branches and other vegetation on our rights-of-way. If you notice problems on county-maintained roads, Tom Rozier shared this information and link to the <u>Citizen Self-Service form</u> on Gwinnett County's website. You can use that form to make requests regarding sight distance issues, road signs, pot holes, etc. related to county roads such as Bush Road, North and South Berkeley Lake Roads and Peachtree Industrial Boulevard in this area. It's a good idea to snap a picture of situations to upload them

with your request. If you need help figuring out what is and is not a county road, this map can be helpful. team practice, checked out the bomb techs, hazardous materials equipment, fire and rescue staff, and a fabulous K-9 officer. We are truly fortunate to live in a place that is served by such competent and dedicated officers.
