Many of you who live on the lake may intend to build, replace or repair sea walls, docks or boathouses while the lake is down. Before beginning any construction, educate yourselves about the rules and permit requirements for your project. The city's website is a great resource for finding helpful information. If you have questions or need clarification on what is required, contact City Hall (770) 368-9484. Understanding the requirements early will allow you to ensure you have secured all necessary permits and approvals in time to do your project while the lake level is optimal.



The **children's park** next to City Hall is open again. We know that kids need a safe place to be outdoors and get some exercise and play, but we urge you to use this area safely. Masks, safe distancing, and hand sanitizing is still important for the kids and all those around them. Our Berkeley Lake Conservancy under the able leadership of Master Gardener Susan Hanson has just completed their efforts on behalf of the **Great Georgia Pollinator Census**. I share this with you because some of you may want to help with it in the future, and Susan would be happy to facilitate that. Citizen scientists across Georgia count the kind and number of pollinators in their yards and gardens by choosing a favorite pollinator plant in their own gardens. For 15 minutes they count and categorize the insects on a UGA census form and then log in the



count. This is important because pollinators (bees, wasps, flies, some birds, butterflies) are absolutely essential for our food supply. The BL Conservancy planted and maintains a pollinator garden at City Hall.



These pictures were taken there by Ed Zawacki. All the plants are native and most are labeled. Stop by for a visit. Orange butterfly weed is essential for monarch butterflies. Georgia aster is on the list of "rare" plants in Georgia. Just remember yellow jackets are not pollinators. Insecticides that kill mosquitoes also kill butterflies and essential pollinators so please avoid those. In our Henderson Nature Sanctuary (also known as Fowler's Mill) there are trees that are great for bees: basswood, Devil's walking stick and
