I know that you have been concerned as I have about **street racers** in our area. I have been talking with our County Commissioner Ben Ku and our Police Precinct Commander, Major Eddie Restrepo about this growing problem. To quote a smidgin of what I wrote recently to them: "Thanks to both of you for your

attention to this matter. When my citizens see large numbers of these cars moving rapidly along our hilly and curvy streets with all lights off, they are strongly aware that it's just a matter of time before someone is seriously hurt or killed as in the recent death in DeKalb. I will continue to be interested in any efforts to prevent that kind of tragedy, whether through enforcement of current laws or through changes that strengthen them." They have both been responsive and are working to help.

I thought about how fortunate we are that our city has virtually no crime when I was reading Major Eddie's recent report to me **comparing BL crime in 2019 to 2020**. "During this reporting period (a year, 2020) Homicide, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Sexual Assault, Commercial Burglary, Arson, and Motor Vehicle Theft have remained the same at zero incidents. Residential Burglaries and Theft from Autos have decreased from 1 incident to zero. Thefts have stayed the same at 3 incidents. Two incidents were off S. Old Peachtree Rd. and involved thefts of catalytic converters/vehicle tag. The last incident involved theft of tires from a business."

Since we're all trying to enjoy outdoor activities in what I hope are the waning days of the pandemic, I thought you might like to know about some **nifty trails for hiking in our area**.
